Church Chat—December, 2017—"Happy Holidays"—John C. Swisher, M.Div.

I hope everyone's holidays are happy, as the above greeting suggests. And interestingly enough, the holy-days around the end of the year are diverse enough, finding happiness in there somewhere ought not to be too hard. Perhaps it would be helpful to outline the territory surrounding our holiday cheer in an inclusive vein, therefore.

No doubt the most familiar of the season's holidays is Christmas, but lots of the accompanying Christmas lore has many diverse roots. The Christian celebration of Jesus' birth is surrounded with many symbols, some of which come from its non-Christian, or pagan, roots. The Christmas tree (including use of Yule logs, holly, and evergreen branches), lighting of candles, feasting, and many other holiday traditions either have their roots in pagan practice or are common to many religious faiths, as well as Christianity. Even the tradition of the virgin birth is found in other stories of the time, such as the birth of Caesar, also said to be born of a virgin. The choice of the Church to place the celebration of the birth of Jesus at the end of the year, very near the winter solstice, the shortest day of the year in the northern hemisphere, was related to pagan celebrations, as well. For the Church wanted to bring in and "Christianize" the followers of local religions in many regions where the solstice, or other holidays were already in place. Most pagan faiths, the Roman holiday of Saturnalia, and Mithraism (a Greek mystery religion) all had holidays at or near the end of the year. Of course, the Christian symbolism of Jesus as the light of the world, coming into the world at its darkest hour (shortest days of the year), has its own symbolism. And perhaps the most widespread of Christmas traditions, gift-giving and Santa Claus, both have their roots in Christmas tradition.

Hanukkah or Chanukah, the other traditional prominent holiday falling in this season, is sometimes called "Jewish Christmas", but bears no connection to Christmas, other than being a holiday of candle-lighting and gift-giving. The historic roots of Hanukkah come from an era well before Jesus of Nazareth, a time when the Jews were persecuted by the Greek empire, and its Hebrew collaborators.

The lighting of the menorah, or hanukiah, of Hanukkah remembers a vigil kept by the Jews after they had thrown off the foreign power and reclaimed their temple back in the 2nd century BCE.

Kwanza, a modern end of the year holiday, began in 1966, started by Maulana Karenga, and is an African-American alternative celebration to Christmas. Emphasizing seven principles, unity, self-determination, collective work/responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith, it is celebrated from 12/26-1/1 and comes from the word for "first fruits".

As your pastor, I wish you Merry Christmas, and I only hope your Christmas is as wonderful as the Peanuts kids was, with the scruffy little tree, the carols sung slightly off-key, and the familiar story bringing a few tears to everyone's eyes. Peace on earth, goodwill to all!!!



### The Giver

Many Christian families struggle with what role — if any — Santa Claus should play in their Christmas celebrations. No matter what you decide, it's fascinating to know the history of the real-life St. Nicholas.

Born about 270 A.D., Nicholas was a bishop in Myra, or modern-day Turkey. In the year 325, he was part of the Council of Nicaea, which produced the Nicene Creed.

Nicholas, known for his generosity, often gave away his money anonymously. According to tradition, he secretly provided dowries for the three daughters of a bankrupt merchant. Nicholas threw two bags of gold through open windows and placed the third in a stocking hanging by the fireplace to dry. Thus began the Christmas tradition of placing gifts in stockings.

St. Nicholas is quoted as saying, "The giver of every good and perfect gift has called upon us to mimic God's giving, by grace, through faith, and this is not of ourselves."

### As Good As Done

Upon the birth of the one who'd become known as John the Baptist, his father, Zechariah, praised God. Zechariah broke his nine-month inability to speak with these words: "Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has looked favorably on his people and redeemed them. He has raised up a mighty savior for us in the house of his servant David, as he spoke through the mouth of his holy prophets from of old" (Luke 1:68-70, NRSV).

Notice how Zechariah describes God's actions as if they had already happened! In Good News of Great Joy, John Piper writes, "Nine months earlier, Zechariah could not believe his wife would have a child. Now, filled with the Holy Spirit, he is so confident of God's redeeming work in the coming Messiah that he puts it in the past tense. For the mind of faith, a promised act of God is as good as done."

### The Perfect Gift

Do you stress about finding just the right gift for everyone on your Christmas list? Does it make the season more a hassle than a joy? Pastor Mike Slaughter reminds us that Christmas isn't about perfect presents for people, as if it were their birthday — or ours. Christmas is about the perfect presence of Immanuel, God with us, through the birth of Jesus; it's his birthday, after all!

In Christmas Is Not Your Birthday (Abingdon), Slaughter writes, "How funny that it can be so hard to find gifts that will please certain family members or friends — the people who seem to have everything — and yet it is so clear what the Lord of lords and King of kings wants for his birthday. God wants you — your time, your talent and your treasure — used in service to others."

### The Great Date Debate

In Lessons of Christmas (Xulon Press), Daniel Armah notes that ancient scholars expressed more than 130 opinions about Jesus' actual birthdate, covering every month of the year. "Even with a debatable date," he concludes, "the blessing of Christmas is obvious."

Likewise, our Christmas celebrations aren't diminished by the possible timing of Jesus' birthday with secular festivals. "If December 25th was chosen to rival other pagan worship activities ... for want of a real date," Armah writes, "then that decision has been successful. Indeed those ancient pagan festivals have all been swallowed up, and Christianity has been growing since."



### Everlasting Joy

In a Chicken Soup for the Soul sampler, Karen Asire tells of a particularly difficult Christmas after her husband left and began divorce proceedings. As Karen and her three young children set up their tree, she fought tears and secretly tucked aside certain ornaments, such as one announcing "Our First Christmas Together."

Several days later, a neighbor stopped by with a gold decoration proclaiming JOY. "We've hung this ornament on our tree for several years," she explained, "but this year we wanted you to have it." When Asire hung it on the tree and stepped back, "all the other ornaments seemed to fade into the background, and all [she] saw was the shimmering gold of the JOY ornament." She allowed herself to cry then, grateful for the reminder that amid grief and heartache, God's love shines.

Pain fades in time, while God's Christmas gift — Jesus — brings joy that lasts forever.


**Our Greatest Need**

If our greatest need had been money, God would have sent us an economist.


If our greatest need had been pleasure, God would have sent us an entertainer.


## JOURNEY TO BETHLEHEM




# POP-UP CARD

Share the good news of Jesus' birth with this creative Christmas card.


### What you need:

- Construction paper (two pieces, including one white)
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Pens
- Glue stick



### What you do:

1. Neatly fold the white paper in half, short side to short side.
2. Draw two parallel lines (at least 2 inches apart) from the fold to about halfway to the edge. Cut along the lines.
3. Fold the cut section back and forth so it pops up.
4. Push the section up so it pops up inside the folded paper. Draw a nativity scene on the pop-up box.
5. Fold the colored paper in half, short side to short side. Place the white paper inside it and glue the white paper down, being careful not to glue the pop-up box.
6. Write a Christmas message and give or send the card to someone.


