Chapel Chat-"Spirit-side Chats" - John Swisher, BCC Chaplain

Some of you may be old enough to remember President Franklin Roosevelt's "Fireside Chats". I'm just a little too young to remember hearing them, since he died about six years before I was born, but I remember a lot of people talking about them.

Here's what an internet site for SCHMOOP University says about them in "FDR's Fireside Chats" a series of 28 radio talks the president broadcast into the homes of Americans from 1933-1944:

"How did one man transform the government so radically, and so quickly? One secret to Roosevelt's success was his <u>"fireside chats."</u> thirty speeches he gave over the radio (and later TV) during his presidency. In his fireside chats, FDR spoke directly to the American people as if they were close friends. The chats were crucial to building support for the <u>New Deal</u> and, later, to mobilizing the nation for <u>World War II</u>. Many Americans came to feel like they were partners in their government with a man whose warm and understanding voice came right into their living rooms. As one businessman later said, "My mother looks upon the President as someone so immediately concerned with her problems and difficulties that she would not be greatly surprised were he to come to her house some evening and stay to dinner."<u>34</u>

Another secret was his political acumen. Like many great politicians, FDR was both idealistic and pragmatic. Behind the scenes, he was constantly "working the room," often bringing on-the-fence Congressmen to the Oval Office to win them over. Even some of the most monumental programs of the <u>New Deal</u> were planned around political expediency. For example, the payment scheme that keeps <u>Social Security</u> running was chosen not for economic reasons, but because FDR knew it would help get the program through Congress and keep it on the books.<u>35</u>

Today, both historians and economists continue to argue about how successful the <u>New Deal</u> really was. While the economy improved significantly under the New Deal, it certainly didn't end the <u>Great Depression</u>; by 1941, there were still six million unemployed Americans.<u>36</u> Conservatives argue that it created a dangerous, quasi-socialist regime in the country. Others, like MIT economist E. Cary Brown, argue that the New Deal didn't go far enough. According to Brown's influential analysis, FDR didn't spend enough money "priming the pump" to truly stimulate the economy out of the Depression.<u>37</u>

Whatever effects the New Deal did have, everyone agrees that the country was ultimately rescued from the Great Depression by something else. Throughout the 1930s, trouble was brewing in Europe. <u>Adolf Hitler</u>, who had assumed near-total control of Germany in 1934, became more and more aggressive in threatening his neighbors. Ultimately, it was <u>World War II</u>—the second major crisis of FDR's presidency—that would finally and completely lift the nation out of the Great Depression."

As I write this little column, the US Senate has failed to come to agreement long enough to keep the government in business. Perhaps we have it bad. But relatively speaking (and I've got some of the most incorrigible relatives so I know what I'm saying here), things could be worse. The government (Crown Prince) of Saudi Arabia just lifted a 35 year ban on public viewing of movies in their country. And guess what the first movie they showed was? The Emoji Movie!!! So how do you really feel about that?

threat, "The Heart Truth" campaign created and introduced the Red Dress as the national symbol for women and heart disease awareness in 2002 to deliver an urgent wakeup call to American women.

Heart disease is a class of diseases that involve the heart, the blood vessels or both. The causes of heart disease are diverse but atherosclerosis or hypertension are the most common. Additionally, with aging come a number of physiological and morphological changes that alter cardiovascular function and lead to subsequently increased risk of cardiovascular disease, even

in healthy asymptomatic individuals. Heart disease is the leading cause of deaths worldwide, though since the 1970s, cardiovascular mortality rates have declined in many high-income countries. At the same time, cardiovascular deaths and disease have increased at a

fast rate in low- and middle-income countries. Although heart disease usually affects older adults, the antecedents of cardiovascular disease begin in early life. There is therefore increased emphasis on preventing atherosclerosis by modifying risk factors, such as healthy eating, exercise, and avoidance of smoking tobacco. (With material from: Wikipedia)

#### In Awe of God

A feel-good gospel is attractive but not transformative, writes Michael Yaconelli in Dangerous Wonder (NavPress). "The

nice, nonthreatening God needs to be replaced by the God whose very presence smashes our egos into dust, burns our sin into ashes, and strips us naked to reveal the real person within. A healthy, childlike fear should make us more in awe of God than we are of our government, our problems, ... our doctrines and agendas, or any of our other earthly concerns."

Yaconelli urges Christians "to become people whose God is big and holy and frightening and gentle and tender and ours; a God whose love frightens us into his strong and powerful arms where he dares to hold us in his terrifying, loving presence."
