Church Chat—Camp, Camps, and Campus--John Swisher, BCC Chaplain

I was recently assigned membership on the Heartland Center's Board, the Heartland Presbytery's camp and conference center board in Parkville, MO (outside KC). Now those of you who know me pretty well, may know as well that camping, and church camping has been a pretty big deal for me, and for quite a while. I started going to this same summer church camp in the summer of 1962 (could that really be 55 years ago?), never missed all the way through high school years, and eventually worked at this same camp the summers of 1969 and 1982 (right out of high school and again one summer while I was in seminary). I also served on the camp board earlier when I was a pastor in St. Joseph for a few years. While on camp staff in 1982, I took my 6 year old daughter hiking up to see the horses at the corral on a day off, and she told me that she really liked that place because God was closer out there. So all in all, that place and I go way back.

So, I thought maybe since we are now right in the middle of summer vacation season, I might take a few moments in this article to talk about camp (as in summer camp), camps (as in prisons, campgrounds, and campsites), and campuses (the geographical sites of institutions). The word camp comes from a Greek word for curved or bent, and has evolved to include a place where you might turn in at the end of a day perhaps, as in a retreat, or roadside stop. Camp and Campus are cognates, that is they derive from the same word, sometimes translated as open field, or yard. I don't know why the prisons (also called camps by the inmates) where I've served both had upper and lower yards, which kind of makes sense at the prison where I work now in Boonville cause the land is rolling and the lower yard is actually lower, but made no sense at WMCC which was all a flat field, no upper or lower to it. I remember being surprised when I started with the DOC when an offender first talked about "being down at another camp before I came here". It took me a little while to figure out that when he said another camp he meant another prison.

But at the prison where I work now, it's not so hard to think of that place as a place to turn in, or a favorable location, like a college campus, lots of trees, stately brick buildings, at least on the outside. I asked some of my chapel workers what their first impressions of BCC were, and fairly enough, they said they thought it looked pretty good. But really, where am I going with this? This is prison, not Princeton. I'm talkin' "State Pen" not Penn State, right? Yes, but perhaps the parallels might be worth mentioning between the two kinds of camps.

Both kinds of camps are meant to be temporary, both meant to be a learning experience, and both designed to help ease an adjustment into adult responsibility, fuller participation in community, and as a transition into professional or vocational confidence. Both kinds of camps are depicted by almost everyone as big trouble, but in fact they can be very helpful. In the words of the old camp song by Allan Sherman, "Hello Muddah, Hello Faddah, Here I am at Camp Grenada. Camp is very entertaining, and they say we'll have some fun if it stops raining" After a long litany of woes, poison ivy, lost campers, bad food, etc., the last verse kind of picks us up, right where camp picks us up. "Wait a minute, it's stopped hailing. Guys are swimming, guys are sailing. Playing baseball, gee that's bettah. Mudda, Faddah kindly disregard this letter"





Independence Day Lessons for Church Life



A Pilgrim's Progress

In *A Million Steps*, Kurt Koontz describes his month-long pilgrimage along the Camino de Santiago ("Way of St. James"), a 490-mile route from southern France through northern Spain. Since the ninth century, millions have undertaken this challenging trek.

As Koontz hiked downhill one morning, he was awed by a gorgeous sunrise. "The path was so steep," he writes, "that I could descend a bit and relive the sunrise over and over. I took a gazillion photos and must have looked back at least 40 times." Yet the experience made Koontz realize that "going forward is difficult when you are always looking backward." We can't dwell on the past so completely that our progress and growth are impeded.




