Church Chat---- "Life Without Limbs---Nick Vujicic's Story"--- John Swisher, Pastor

We recently received a DVD at the Chapel at the prison donated from the group, "Life Without Limbs". I wanted to share it with you because it is not just motivational or inspirational, but because reminds us what it is to be human, and hopefully why that's important whether viewed through the lenses of faith or not. As above the DVD is a presentation by Nick Vujicic at the Barry Telford Unit of the Texas DOC from May 19, 2016. If you want to get some background on Nick and the organization and have a computer just "google" him by name or at lifewithoutlimbs.org.

He reminds me of a guy who spoke a few years ago at a local Boone's Lick Area Prayer Breakfast in Boonville. He had been the victim of a gasoline fire which he set playing with matches as a small child. He lived through many surgeries and medical procedures after his parents were told he would not survive. He had also lost most of his fingers and toes and had been burned over most of his body. After surviving the accident, living through multiple reconstructive surgeries and skin grafts, he had gone on to complete college, have a family, and do motivational/inspirational speaking.

Anyway, I don't want to go on and on about tough luck stories, but the trouble with all of them is that they tend to obscure everything else in life, not the drama necessarily, but just the facts, as Joe Friday on Dragnet used to say, themselves. Both of the guys above went on to live and are still living lives of meaning and purpose.

Recently, I was visiting with an offender who was going home (with his "walk-around" papers at the prison where I work) and he told me he wasn't "very religious" person. Naturally, I took the bait on this one. What he meant was he had his beliefs, but he didn't always think that God was behind everything and anything that occurred in life. I told him I must not be "very religious" either, that I agreed with him if that was what he meant, because I didn't go along with all the testimonies I heard about "Everything happens for a reason", or "God must have wanted another angel in heaven (at the time of someone's death)", or the one I really don't like "God never gives you more than you can bear". All they do is just get in the way of what God does do, it seems to me.

While there may be causes for everything which happens in life, a reason often eludes us, at least it eludes me in many cases. For whatever reason, bad stuff can and does happen in this life, and I have to say I don't think God is the author of all that stuff. As far as God wanting more angels in heaven, that one just seems cruel to me. The third one is a misquote from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 10:13, which is not even about burdens we carry, it's about temptations we have to overcome. It really says God never gives you more temptations than you bear, and also that God provides a way out of times when you might be tempted to act immor-ally or in "low-down" (not upright) ways.

How about you? Are you "very religious"? Moderately? Or not at all? Let me know if you're thinking about this stuff, cause it might help us make whatever religious inclination we have be more faithful and helpful, to God, each other, and in our own lives.

In Communion

I Shall Not Need

Despite the traditional wording ("The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want"), Psalm 23 declares that God provides everything we need — not everything we desire.

"He makes me lie down ... " Sometimes our busyness is useful; other times it's how we feel in control or superior to others. God knows we need to rest and sometimes must make us do so!

"He leads me beside still waters ... " Although we often prefer noisy distractions, God knows we need quiet to hear him and have our souls restored.

"You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies." Rather than a boast ("Ha! See how God spreads a banquet in my honor while others look on!"), this is a reminder that God wants us to dine with our enemies. We might not be able to stand those people, but God pursues reconciliation.

In the process, "goodness and mercy ... follow me all ... my life." That's what we need the most.

A door symbolizes our invitation to engage in prayer and personal relationship with Jesus: "Knock and the door will be opened to you" (Matthew 7:7, NIV). Conversely, a door represents Jesus' desire to be invited into our lives and hearts: "I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me" (Revelation 3:20, NIV).



Always Value

When Paul talks about treasure in clay jars (2 Corinthians 4:6-9), he's referring to the gospel message. The apostle compares the human carriers of the treasure, including himself, to breakable vessels that aren't impervious to outside influences and can fail. But that causes the carriers to rely on God's strength when facing afflictions.

Part of the usefulness of the image — and Paul knows this — is that broken clay jars were used as blank "pages" for writing letters, business receipts, invitations to meals and weddings, and so on. He emphasizes that even when we're broken, we're useful in God's kingdom. When we feel defeated by failure, Jesus still considers us valuable.

The fan said, "Keep your cool." The ceiling said, "Aim high." The window said, "Look outside yourself." The clock said, "Every minute is precious." The calendar said, "Stay up to date." The door said, "Take advantage of opportunity." The floor said, "Kneel down and pray." —Unknown (adapted)

Seeds of Victory

Months before the U.S. won the World War II Battle of Midway, code analysts planted the seeds of victory far from the battle site. Using primitive predecessors to today's computers, they cracked a Japanese code, enabling America to avoid an ambush.

I wonder if those analysts got frustrated before the solution became clear. Did they ever believe hope was lost or wonder if all their work was worthwhile?

Christians, likewise, can feel discouraged. We wonder if our attempts to teach kids about Jesus will ever bear fruit, if our small outreach efforts really make a difference and if sin and brokenness can ever be defeated.

We won't see all the results of our labors, but we can trust they're not in vain. The same Spirit who helps us plant the seeds will bring them to harvest. And Jesus has already won the "battle" raging around us — the enemy forces just don't know it yet! —Heidi Mann
